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Section 35 Development Account

Overview

- 35.1 Pursuant to the proposal of the Secretary-General in his report entitled "Renewing the United Nations: a programme for reform" (A/51/950), the General Assembly, in its resolution 52/12 B of 19 December 1997, decided, inter alia, to establish a development account in the programme budget for the biennium 1998-1999. In its resolution 52/221 A of 22 December 1997, the Assembly approved an appropriation of \$13,065,000 for the Development Account under section 34 of the programme budget for the biennium 1998-1999.
- 35.2 In accordance with General Assembly resolution 52/235 of 26 June 1998, in which the Assembly requested a detailed report on the sustainability of the Development Account, the modalities of its implementation, the specific purposes and the associated performance criteria for the use of resources, the Secretary-General submitted a report on the modalities for operating the Development Account (A/53/945). Having considered that report and the related report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (A/53/7/Add.12), the General Assembly, in its resolution 54/15 of 29 October 1999, decided, inter alia, to establish a special multi-year account for supplementary development activities based on the programmes of the approved medium-term plan.
- 35.3 In its resolution 54/250 A of 23 December 1999, the General Assembly approved an appropriation of \$13,065,000 for the Development Account under section 33 of the programme budget for the biennium 2000-2001. In the last three bienniums (1998-1999, 2000-2001 and 2002-2003), the General Assembly has approved 43 projects for funding through the Development Account.
- 35.4 The resources for the Development Account in the programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005 amount to \$13,065,000 and are at the same level as for the three other tranches. Detailed proposals on the use of this amount in 2004-2005 are based on the arrangements concerning the procedure and process for the use of the Development Account approved by the General Assembly in its resolutions 53/220 A of 7 April 1999, 53/220 B of 8 June 1999, 54/15, 54/249 of 23 December 1999 and 56/237 of 24 December 2001.

Projects proposed for funding from the Development Account during the biennium 2004-2005

I. Introduction

1. The present annex contains, for the information of the General Assembly, detailed descriptions of the projects to be financed under section 35 of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005.
2. The 23 projects, which focus on meeting the millennium development goals through knowledge management, partnerships and taking advantage of information and communication technology, have been submitted by 10 entities of the Executive Committee on Economic and Social Affairs working in collaboration with other entities of the United Nations system and international and national non-governmental organizations.
3. Activities under both section 23, Regular programme for technical cooperation, and section 35, Development Account, aim to assist Member States in implementing the outcomes of the United Nations Millennium Summit held in New York from 6 to 8 September 2000 and the major United Nations conferences dealing with economic and social issues. These activities are closely related to the normative and analytical work of the entities in the economic and social sector of the Secretariat.
4. Section 23 serves as the core foundation for technical cooperation by the respective entities of the Secretariat, mostly through advisory services and training activities, in response to specific requests of Member States. Such requests for capacity-building in strategic areas of their socio-economic development are often unforeseen at the time the proposed programme budget is formulated. In turn, the Development Account provides a common platform for technical cooperation work, delivered through individual multi-year projects with both a regional and a subregional focus. The projects are formulated and implemented within the framework of the Executive Committee to avoid duplication, to ensure the unity of purpose and to optimize the use of scarce resources.
